House of Delegates: Pros and Cons

ACCP has periodically dealt with issues related to governance, leadership opportunities, and member involvement beyond the usual committee work and activities of the PRNs. One notable example

is a survey on organizational governance requested by President John E. Murphy in 2009, which led to the subsequent appointment of a special task force on governance by President James E. Tisdale. This task force was formed to provide recommendations to the Board of Regents on how ACCP could expand the field of members (particularly members without primary academic appointments) in ACCP elections. Another governance-related issue relates to consideration of a house of delegates for ACCP. Currently, the ACCP Board of Regents sets policy for ACCP per se, and as separate tax-exempt entities, the ACCP Foundation Board of Trustees and Pharmacotherapy Publications Board of Directors set the policy for their respective areas of responsibility (albeit with accountability to the Board of Regents). In the College's early stages of growth and development, it would have been onerous and likely resource-prohibitive for ACCP to have a house of delegates, but with today's membership of over 18,000, the organization is large enough to reconsider this issue.

As someone who buys into the general concept of evidence-based medicine, I did a quick search to see whether any papers discussed the advantages and disadvantages of a house-of-delegates and/or board policy-approval process by not-for-profit organizations. I was surprised by the lack of useful literature on this topic. I thus began compiling my own list of *potential* pros and cons of ACCP's creating a house of delegates (see table). I use the word *potential* because I don't think most

of these arguments for or against a house of delegates are as dichotomous as they sound; rather, they represent tendencies on a more continuous scale. This list was developed from my own experiences as a member of several not-for-profit organizations and associations with and without houses of delegates.

I think the pro arguments are relatively straightforward, but some of the con arguments deserve further explanation. Clearly, a house of delegates can be resourceintensive. Although the process may seem episodic to members of an organization, there are ongoing activities that require dedicated staff and volunteer leaders' time. Furthermore, there are cost considerations such as securing meeting rooms or virtual platforms large/ extensive enough to accommodate the necessary number of delegates. Two other potential cons of a house-ofdelegates approach to policy-making are the tendency to develop unnecessary policy and the process itself, which some observers and participants consider proverbial "sausage-making" (i.e., it is difficult to watch, regardless of the outcome) with the invariable grandstanding and wordsmithing. The unnecessary policy often comes from delegates' natural urge to want to do something. Delegates may think that given the time, effort, and money devoted to this process, "we better pass something." This can result in a feel-good policy that does little good - or worse yet, leads to policy that is counterproductive to the organization's mission or efficient operation.

I want to conclude by saying that, in general, I think ACCP's approach to policy development has worked well, and I do not feel compelled to pine for a house of delegates. Here is a brief overview of ACCP's current policy-making process. Any ACCP member is welcome to suggest policy to be considered by the Board of Regents. After discussion and deliberation, and if the Board feels action is warranted, staff will be charged with developing a draft policy for review. Or, for less time-sensitive issues, the Board may refer the potential policy to a committee for further discussion and development. The Board will then review and possibly suggest refinements to the draft. Once there is general agreement on the policy's wording, the Board will consider it for approval. Past experience suggests that the timeline for this process is much shorter than for a house-of-delegates approach. In closing, I suspect I may have missed some important pros or cons in my discussion of this issue, or placed undue emphasis on some items, so I welcome your feedback.

NEW CLINICAL PRACTICE—FOCUSED PROGRAMMING AT THE 2020 ACCP ANNUAL MEETING

"Clinical Pharmacy and Telehealth: Design, Implementation, and Practice" will be released Monday, October 26, at 2:30 p.m. (CST), and will be followed by a live Q&A with the presenters at 3:45 p.m. This session will be available on-demand to Annual Meeting registrants. In this session, Dr. Leeann Webster will present "Designing a Successful Telehealth Program." She will describe her experience with designing and implementing pharmacistled telehealth visits across a health care system in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, including legal, regulatory, and financial considerations. Next, Dr. Melissa Badowski will discuss her CMM telehealth program, describing the selection and application of appropriate implementation tools and the ongoing benefits and challenges of sustaining a successful telehealth program. 2021 Futures Grants: Mentored Research Awards

The ACCP Foundation's Futures Grants program for student, trainee, and early-career ACCP members is designed to support the development of research skills and establish sustained interest and careers in pharmacy research. The amount of Futures Grants awards ranges from \$5000 to \$40,000, depending on applicant eligibility and budget approval. Up to \$100,000 in mentored, developmental research awards are expected to be distributed through the Futures Grants program in 2021.

The next grant application cycle will open May 15, 2021, and completed applications will be due no later than September 1, 2021. Grants will be reviewed and scored by translational category of the research in addition to the applicant's eligibility level. The 2020 Futures Grants application period closed September 1, and award recipients will be announced by November 15, 2020.

Investigator Development

The Foundation's research development programs will return in 2021, after the pandemic forced cancellations last June.

Mentored Research Investigator Training (MeRIT) Program

This one-of-a-kind training program is designed to help pharmacists develop the abilities necessary to conduct investigator-initiated research, either independently as a principal investigator or as an active co-investigator within a research team. Ideal candidates for the MeRIT Program are pharmacy faculty or practitioners with limited research experience who are:

- Committed to incorporating research into their professional careers;
- Interested in generating research themes or obtaining preliminary data for larger funding opportunities; and
- Aspiring to be active principal investigators or co-investigators within a research team.

MeRIT is a 2-year longitudinal program that uses a combination of live and virtual teaching and mentoring methods to provide trainees with the support and education they need throughout the research experience (i.e., from idea, proposal development, funding application, and project completion to presentation and publication).

The application period for the 2021 MeRIT Program will open in November 2020, with letters of intent due February 28, 2021, and full applications due March 31, 2021. The primer program will be held June 21–25, 2021, on the campus of the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy in Lexington.

Focused Investigator Training (FIT) Program

The Foundation's flagship pharmacist investigator training program will also continue June 21–25, 2021, at the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy in Lexington. If you plan to submit (or resubmit) a research proposal to the NIH or other major foundation/organization funding source, FIT should be on your agenda.

This 5-day, intensive, hands-on program has a strong history of participant success, as it pairs experienced and funded faculty mentors with investigator-participants. The program is geared to fine-tune R-type investigator-initiated proposals and K-type career development awards. The ideal applicant is a mid-career, fellowship-trained, tenure-track or research-focused pharmacist. The application period for the 2021 FIT Program will open in November 2020, with letters of intent due February 28, 2021, and full applications due March 31, 2021.

WASHINGTON UPDATE

ACCP Government and Professional Affairs COVID Response Summary

As the nation's leaders and policy-makers struggle with the ongoing response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the ACCP team in Washington, D.C., has been collaborating with its partner pharmacy organizations and an established network of external health care stakeholder coalitions to help align the appropriate resources and expertise within the profession with the complex needs that exist within the nation's care delivery systems. The following paragraphs summarize the advocacy efforts the College has helped lead.

Pharmacy-Specific Initiatives

- Thirteen-organization JCPP-led <u>letter</u> seeking guidance from the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS) on pharmacist authorization under the Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness Act (PREP Act) to order and administer FDA-authorized COVID-19 vaccines. To avoid misunderstandings by state and local regulators and any resulting delays, the letter called on HHS to specify that its declaration under the PREP Act preempts any state or local requirement that prohibits or effectively prohibits a pharmacist from ordering and administering a COVID-19 vaccine.
- ACCP/IDSA/SHEA <u>response</u> to HHS guidance on pharmacist-provided COVID testing.
- ACCP <u>statement</u> to Senate HELP Committee highlighting pharmacist leadership in COVID testing stewardship.

The Get the Medications Right (GTMRx) Institute is a multi-stakeholder collaboration formed to ensure the appropriate and personalized use of medication and gene therapies by advancing to a scientific, evidence-based, and cost-effective decision-making process and a teambased, systematic approach to medication use. Since its inception, over 950 individuals and organizations, including professional organizations, provider groups, patient advocacy and consumer groups, and pharmaceutical, diagnostics, and IT companies – together with employers and payers – have joined GTMRx in this work.

Released in July 2020, the GTMRx Blueprint for Change outlines steps for medication optimization, including adoption of an evidence-based process of care, implementation of CMM, and application of a personalized approach that enhances care, reduces costs, and improves patient satisfaction and provider worklife. The blueprint is based on 8 months of multi-stakeholder input and guidance to facilitate, engage, and promote medication optimization. The Blueprint Launch Resource Center contains several other useful items, including an evidence document summarizing key papers, case examples, FAQs, and social media tools.

Election Year Grassroots Action: Advocacy Is a Process, Not an Intervention

Consistent with the College's <u>Strategic Plan</u> focused on positioning and advancing the profession in evolving team-based care structures, ACCP is committed to an <u>advocacy platform</u> that not only goes well beyond seeking recognition for the value of pharmacists (the "who"), but also carefully defines the value of the clinical care process that contributes directly to improved patient outcomes (the "what").

Like patient care, development of health policy, particularly at the federal level, is complex and everevolving. The College's work to define comprehensive medication management (CMM) as a clinical service was in recognition that you can't "get the medications right" without a comprehensive process of patient care. Similarly, development of complex health policy requires commitment to a comprehensive advocacy process that helps policy-makers at all levels fully understand, and appropriately value, the clinical services of pharmacists in team-based medication optimization.

Call to Action

A successful ACCP advocacy process requires clinical pharmacist—led education and relationship development to ensure policy-makers across all levels of government fully understand the importance of medication optimization as a core component of patient-centered, quality-focused practice structures and why board-certified clinical pharmacists are uniquely trained and qualified to deliver these essential services as part of integrated care teams. Here are suggestions to help build an effective grassroots advocacy process:

Register to Vote

Voting is the simplest but most important civic responsibility. Because of COVID-19, there may be changes to when, where, and how you vote in your upcoming elections.

Send a Letter to Congress

Given that clinical pharmacists (Marcia Buck, Kathy Pham, and Amie Brooks) make up most of the College's Government and Professional Affairs team, ACCP is sincere in its belief that its members are the most effective advocates for their profession and their patients. Members of Congress need to hear from clinical pharmacists delivering direct patient care services in their state or district to learn firsthand about the value clinical pharmacists bring to the medication optimization process.

The ongoing COVID pandemic means that health care issues are of high priority to policy-makers. It is important they hear from you to learn how your work improves the lives of patients and contributes to enhanced health care team efficiency.

Contacting the offices of your elected officials is simple. The College has prepared a letter for you to review and edit. Simply follow the instructions to send this message to Capitol Hill. Please take the time to personalize the letter by providing additional information about your practice and the patients you care for and highlight

what the COVID pandemic has meant for your practice and patients.

As policy-makers assess the strengths and weaknesses of the nation's health care infrastructure, it is vital they hear about the ongoing work of clinical pharmacists.

ACCP-ASHP-VCU Congressional Healthcare Policy Fellow Update

Nimit Jindal is currently serving as the American College of Clinical Pharmacy–American Society of Health-System Pharmacists–Virginia Commonwealth University Congressional Healthcare Policy Fellow for 2020–2021.

Jindal recently completed a PGY1 community-based pharmacy residency at Moose Pharmacy in Concord, North Carolina, through the UNC Eshelman School of Pharmacy program. He earned his Pharm.D. degree from the Ernest Mario School of Pharmacy at Rutgers. Jindal completed an 8-week orientation with the Government Affairs teams of the sponsoring organizations. He will spend the next 12 months serving as a health policy staff member on the U.S. Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP) working for the minority under Sen. Patty Murray (D-WA).

Launched in 2006 under the guidance of ACCP's Dr. C. Edwin Webb, the fellow program comprises unique health care policy learning experiences in the U.S. Congress and the Government Affairs offices of ACCP and ASHP. Pharmacists who participate in the program have the opportunity to gain real-world insight into health care policy analysis and development through immersion in the congressional environment. Fellows are actively mentored in legislative evaluation, policy development, research, and writing while integrating practical experience with theory.

Jindal decided to attend pharmacy school because, as the son of an independent pharmacy owner, he grew up working in the pharmacy as a cashier and interacting with an underserved patient population. "I would see a lot of patients decline certain medications simply because they couldn't afford them, even with insurance," he said. "I saw community practice as a way of making a difference on the ground, in the communities, and serving the patients I felt compelled to help when I was a cashier in that environment," he said, adding:

In pharmacy school, I heard a lot about payment models and delivery models. I was interested in getting engaged in policy, but I knew that before I could do that, I needed to understand how those models work, so that's why I pursued a community pharmacy residency.

For the past 2 years, Jindal has served as the Piscataway Township Ward 4 Elected Committeeman, where he has engaged with elected members of the local and state governments to develop policy solutions to infrastructure and educational funding concerns. This experience and other opportunities he has had that influence policy changes fueled his decision to pursue this fellowship. "I'm really excited about this program because I feel like I have a good idea of how patients access care in our communities," he said. "There's really no other program in the country that allows you to develop such a strong foundation to go out and make meaningful changes in the health care policy environment."

After completing the fellowship, Jindal hopes to continue to be engaged in health policy development, whether at a state or federal level: "I think keeping pharmacists and other health care providers involved in the policy conversation is how we really push the envelope forward."


