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

### Message from the Chair

Lori Ann Wilken, PharmD, BCACP, NCTTP, AE-C It has been an honor to serve as the Pulmonary PRN Chair for the 2019-2020 term. It has been an amazing experience meeting and working with clinical pharmacists from around the country.

This year, despite all of the obstacles of a global pandemic and the world being shut-down, the members of this PRN suited up with personal protective equipment and took care of patients with COVID-19 while other members were helping test patients in the community for the virus.

Valuable observations and data about the coronavirus were published by some members. Others were part of protests around the country and the world to demonstrate the injustices minority citizens face every day. Pharmacies were

looted and closed. Members of our PRN helped patients find ways to fill their everyday medications. It is this dedication to patient care, research, and education, that makes me feel so proud to be a part of ACCP and the Pulmonary PRN.

This was the first year that the Pulmonary PRN committee members started working together to make significant

contributions to our profession. Our Workforce and Strategic Committee, chaired by Paul Boylan and Megan Fleischman, updated the ACCP Pulmonary PRN website, set up a twitter account for the PRN and generated our PRN reports for ACCP.

The Education, Programming, and Communication Committee, chaired by Jean Moon, developed our Pulmonary PRN focus session for the annual meeting. The session, "Breath of Fresh Air" includes timely topics of electronic cigarettes, measuring fractional exhaled nitric oxide and blood eosinophils, and using biologic agents for asthma and COPD.

Our Research Committee, led by Brittany Bissell, has started a multicenter trial examining the dosing of steroids in critically ill patients with COPD exacerbations. Seven PRN members and sites are contributing to the study. Other members of the Pulmonary PRN Research Committee have teamed up to write a review article on the ophylline.

The momentum has started, and the Pulmonary PRN needs to keep progressing forward with big ideas and results. We need to keep working together across the country and the world to let our profession, other professions and the public know how important it is to have clinical pharmacists involved in the care of patients with pulmonary diseases. Our PRN needs to continue to provide quality education, research, and publications to share our expertise and to promote our profession. Our students and residents need the opportunity to participate in our PRN committees so they can learn from us and quickly step into clinical and leadership roles. Continuing quarterly virtual meetings for the entire PRN will allow all members to participate and have a voice.

I have no doubt that with the incoming leadership of Brittany Bissell as Chair, Jean Moon as Chair-Elect and Megan Fleischman as Secretary, and all of you, that the our momentum will continue even if the world stops again.



## **PRN Student Spotlight**





My name is Zeynia Abdu, a 3rd-year pharmacy student. My mother was born in Ethiopia. When I was a child, my mother was diagnosed with asthma. I remember coming home every day from school and taking a long walk with her through the quiet countryside to help her relax and get some air. I also needed to spend some nights with her, as symptoms got worse at night. She required medicine to relieve her shortness of breath and started taking an albuterol inhaler. Her physician started a daily "pink color tablet" as her primary medication and took the prednisolone nonstop for years.

As a pharmacy student, I feel sad because my mom did not know the side effects of long-term oral corticosteroids and I feel angry wondering how that happened when she had routine follow ups. Back in those days in Ethiopia, people could buy prescription medications without a prescription. Of course, things have changed now and medication usage is highly regulated.

One fateful day, my mom gave birth to my baby brother. He was born with a congenital malformation. As the physicians discussed what caused the congenital disability, they realized she had been taking the prednisolone throughout the pregnancy. No matter the exact cause, this situation started my desire to study pharmacy. This story underscores how medical literacy, patient education, proper follow up, and excellent provider-patient communication plays essential roles in optimal health maintenance. After my brother's birth, my mom not only stopped the prednisolone, but hated every kind of modern medicine. Nowadays, her preferred choice of treatment is herbal medicine and she uses a mixture of garlic, ginger and honey when she has difficulty breathing. After this experience, I grew a passion for studying pharmacy to properly counsel and help my community.
